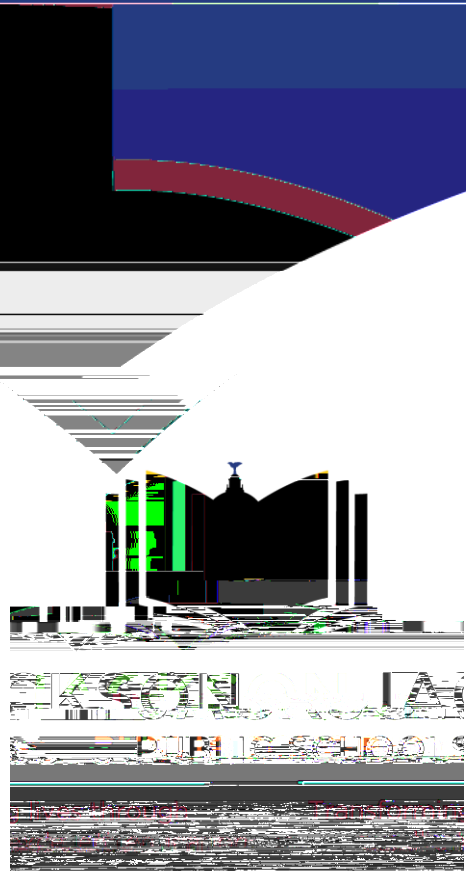

# What are ESSER Funds?

ESSER: Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds

Federal funds that have been allocated to support public schools in addressing the impact of COVID-19

There were three rounds of COVID related stimulus funding to support public schools

Such interventions might include extended time activities that respond to academic, social and emotional needs and the disproportionate impact of the pandemic on certain at-risk student groups.</p>
